Agriculture Pathways - Explore or Dig Deep!

Animal Science

The Animal Science pathway provides students the opportunity to study large, small, and specialty animals. Students explore diet, genetics, habitats, and behavior to create humane, ecologically, and economically sustainable animal production systems. The pathway focuses on production and veterinary care with an emphasis on the study of animal anatomy, physiology, nutrition, reproduction, health, and welfare.

Agriscience

The Agriscience pathway helps students acquire a broad understanding of several critical food & fiber system disciplines with an emphasis on plant & soil science. Centered on emerging technologies in agriculture, students participate in occupationally relevant agricultural experiences, work cooperatively within groups, and develop and expand their leadership profiles. Students study California agriculture, agri-business, biotech applications, animal systems, plant systems, and agri-food systems.

Agricultural Mechanics

The Agricultural Mechanics pathway prepares students for careers related to construction, equipment operation, design & fabrication and agricultural engineering. These courses offer articulated college credits and develop skills in safety, woodworking, electrical wiring & motors, plumbing, metalworking, concrete & masonry and multiple welding processes. Advanced students specialize in metal fabrication, machining, and computer numerical control (CNC) cutting & milling.

What is FFA?

The FFA is a national, intracurricular youth leadership organization that emphasizes agricultural education. FFA develops students' potential and helps them discover their talents through hands-on experiential learning, which gives members the tools to achieve real-world success. Students become involved in FFA through agriculture classes offered at Davis Senior High School (and many other high schools across the nation).

The Three Circle Model of Agriculture Education

Every agriculture class across the nation uses the Three Circle Model of Agriculture Education, which includes Classroom Instruction, Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE), and FFA leadership development. Classroom Instruction is contextual instruction and learning provided by agriculture teachers during school hours. Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE), is project-based experiential learning that takes place outside of class time and connects students to agricultural industries through real-world work experience. FFA is a youth organization within agricultural education



that develops premier leadership, personal growth and career success. Students have a chance to learn life lessons, develop public speaking skills, and prepare themselves for careers, while having fun along the way!

FFA Structure & History

Since 1928, FFA has been a critical part of agricultural education throughout the nation. Because FFA has over 660,000 members, it is structured in different levels: national, state, region, section, and chapter. The Davis FFA Chapter is part of the Yolo Section which includes schools around Yolo County like Woodland, Winters, and Esparto. Yolo Section is part of the Central Region which includes schools from all over the central valley. The Central Region is part of the California State FFA which, in turn, is part of the National FFA Organization.

The Davis FFA Chapter was chartered and officially recognized by the National FFA Organization in 1974. Some of the first FFA members to join the Davis FFA were Tim Biggar, Lorraine Rocha, Bill Swan, David Andrews, and Verdis Upton. Since the creation of the program, Davis FFA has been heavily involved in Career Development Events (CDE). Our most successful CDE teams to date have been Agriscience, Light Horse Judging, Vegetable Crop Judging, and Agricultural Mechanics. Davis FFA has also been extremely involved in the livestock competitions at the Yolo County Fair, taking home numerous awards over the years. On the national level, Davis FFA has been recognized as a premier chapter and awarded the Gold National Chapter Award. We aim to continue our legacy of excellence through continued growth and development for many years to come.

Vision 2030 – A Plan for Yolo County

As a matter of policy to help promote and expand the agricultural base, Yolo County Plan 2030 calls for the encouragement of the FFA and the promotion of agricultural innovation to include research and development, biotechnology, and sustainable farm practices. As a program, we look forward to developing our objectives and offerings in line with this county-wide vision.

A Path to the Future - Ag is opening doors with three industry pathways and a revitalized facility!

In October, 2020, DJUSD received \$9 million in facilities grant funds from the State of California to improve Career Technical Education facilities at Davis Senior High School and Da Vinci High School. These grants were fund matched by DJUSD through the passage of Measure M (which was approved by Davis voters in 2018). These funds are being utilized to construct a new building for the Engineering/Robotics pathway, a new vehicle repair bay for the Transportation pathway and to renovate the Shop, Barn, Greenhouse, and Classrooms for our three Agriculture pathways. Construction on all three projects began in spring 2022 and is anticipated to be completed in winter of 2022.

The Discovery FFA Degree, the Greenhand FFA Degree and the Chapter FFA Degree are awarded at the chapter level. State associations award top members with the State FFA Degree. The highest degree, the American FFA Degree, is conferred upon an elite group of members at the national level.

Opening and Closing

In the Opening and Closing contest, students compete in teams of six to perform the Official FFA Opening and Closing ceremonies used at all meetings and official FFA events. Each student will choose an officer position, memorize their part and perform the ceremonies with their team. Well performed ceremonies build pride and enthusiasm, not only in the officer team, but within the entire chapter.

Creed

This is a speaking contest for freshmen only, to introduce them to public speaking. Students memorize the FFA Creed and are scored based on the delivery of their speech and questions on its meaning and purpose.

Impromptu Public Speaking

The Impromptu Public Speaking Contest is for 10th grade students only. Students will compete in two rounds of speaking. The first round is a response to an agriculture-related question. The second round is a response to a key word or quote. The primary purpose of the event is to demonstrate the student's ability to compose and deliver coherent and focused oral presentations with limited preparation time.

Prepared Public Speaking

The purpose of the Prepared Public Speaking Career Development Event is to foster and develop the speaking abilities of FFA members as well as develop their self confidence and contribute to their advancement in interpersonal skills attainment and leadership development. Students write their own 6-8 minute speech and learn how to deliver the speech to an audience.

Extemporaneous Public Speaking

The FFA Extemporaneous Public Speaking Contest is designed to develop the ability of all FFA members to express themselves on a given agricultural subject without having prepared or rehearsed its content in advance. This gives the FFA members an opportunity to formulate their remarks for presentation in a very limited amount of time. The event requires students to think on their feet, state their case quickly and persuasively, and to be able to answer relevant questions based upon their presentation. A topic is assigned to them at the competition, they then have 20 minutes to develop and deliver speech.

Job Interview Contest

This contest is designed to test a student's ability to communicate in both oral and written form. During this event the student creates a cover letter and resume describing their job skills and experiences. The students must also fill out a job application and complete an interview with a panel of judges.

Compete in Career Development Event (CDE) Judging Teams

Career Development Events develop college and career readiness skills. The competitive events serve as an outgrowth of instruction in the agricultural education classroom for FFA members.

Through CDEs, participating FFA members are challenged to develop critical thinking skills and effective decision-making skills, foster teamwork and promote communication while recognizing the value of ethical competition and individual achievement.

CDE events occur at the local, state and national level. They are designed and regularly evaluated to meet AFNR Career Cluster Content Standards. <u>All contests adhere to California Curricular Codes.</u>

Veterinary Science

The Veterinary Science CDE evaluates students' knowledge and skills in anatomy and technical competency with small and large animals. Participants are scored on written exams, critical thinking scenarios, identifications, and tactile tests.

Agricultural Mechanics

The Agricultural Mechanics CDE seeks to effectively prepare the students for the expectations of a technical career. Workers seeking careers in agricultural mechanics must develop a high degree of knowledge and skill partnered with the ability to solve difficult problems. This event blends the testing of manipulative skills and knowledge required for careers in engineering, fabrication, and construction. Students develop technical knowledge and an ability to work with others to solve complex agricultural problems.

Agriscience Fair

Agriscience Fair recognizes students who gain real-world, hands-on experiences in agricultural enterprises. Students use scientific principles and emerging technologies to solve complex problems related to agriculture, food, and natural resources. The agriscience fair is for middle and high school students. Participation begins at the local level and progresses to state and national levels.

Cooperative Marketing

The Marketing event seeks to effectively prepare the students with the practices and operations of Agricultural Cooperatives. Workers seeking careers in cooperative marketing must not only develop a high degree of knowledge and skill they must also develop the ability to solve difficult problems. This event blends the testing of manipulative skills and knowledge required for careers in operations and marketing.

Poultry Evaluation

The Poultry Evaluation CDE test students' skills in the production, processing, and marketing of chickens, turkeys, processed poultry products and eggs. The poultry Career Development Event seeks to effectively prepare the students for jobs in the poultry industry. The contest blends practical hands-on experiences with a basic knowledge of the poultry industry required for careers in the poultry field.

Participate in Chapter Activities

Our Calendar is Available Online!

Every year the officer team develops a calendar for the year ahead. This calendar reflects the activities that Davis FFA will host and participate in. Some activities, like school farm clean-up days will be hosted by our chapter, and others like conferences, are hosted by the other local, state, or national levels of FFA.

Every month we have a Chapter Meeting where any member of Davis FFA can come to learn about the upcoming opportunities in the FFA program. We always have an activity planned for each meeting. There are a variety of exciting activities happening this year that can be found on our chapter website. We look forward to seeing students actively participate throughout the year!

Activity Highlights

Homecoming

This year Davis FFA will have a float in the annual homecoming parade. This activity will increase the visibility of FFA on the Davis Senior High School campus while supporting school athletics and boosting morale for FFA members. FFA members can ride on the float, assist with float building, or cheer from the parade route. This is an excellent way for members to get involved on campus in an exciting way!



Chapter Officer Leadership Conference

COLC, or Chapter Officer Leadership Conference is a regional level leadership convention for FFA officers. Officers spend the conference in workshops where they learn about everything from new games to play at chapter meetings, to fundraising ideas, to taking proper notes at a meeting. After this time officers are

regrouped with their team where they participate in team building activities. Officers are challenged with learning the strengths and weaknesses of not only themselves, but other officers as well. Throughout the conference, there are group sessions and time to mingle and share ideas with officers from other chapters. This conference offers a unique opportunity to better chapter officers' leadership skills and professionalism. These skills will ultimately improve the chapter, as the officer team brings back what they have learned to lead better meetings and activities.



Yolo Section Corn Maze

Every year we bring a group of students to a local corn maze. This fun night is a great time to get lost and find yourself again with your friends by your side. FFA members from all over Yolo County attend this event, so it is a great place to make friends from other schools and enjoy fall fun.





Yolo Section Ice Skating

Each year, members of Davis FFA go ice skating with fellow FFA members from around Yolo County. This is a great opportunity for students to have fun, make new friends, and develop their ties to FFA at a sectional level.

Degree Night

Degree Night is held as a celebration for chapter members who earned their Discovery, Greenhand, or Chapter Degree. Those wishing to earn this honor must attend the November chapter meeting, where they review and fill out an application. The banquet is provided by the Davis FFA Booster Club and free to all students. Parents or others in attendance will be charged ten dollars to help cover the cost of dinner. In addition to dinner, students will also receive their Chapter, Greenhand, or Discovery pin and a certificate of completion. This is always a fun night and a great way of honoring those students who wish to further



their excellence in the FFA. These degrees are the gateway to even higher achievement.

National FFA Week



National FFA week gives Davis FFA the opportunity to showcase our program on the Davis Senior High School campus, and at the junior high schools in Davis. At Davis High we set up lunchtime activities that teach students a little about an agricultural industry. The activities can include vegetable crop identification, branding, apple bobbing, and kiss the goat. Kiss the goat is a fundraiser where teachers volunteer to possibly kiss a goat on the quad in front of the entire school. Each teacher has a jar and students put money in these jars,

because whoever ends up with the most has to kiss the goat!

FFA Shadow Day & Junior High Recruitment

For junior high recruitment, the officer team hosts FFA Shadow Day. This is a day for Junior High School students to visit the DSHS campus and attend classes with an FFA member. In addition to this day, the officer team develops a lesson and hands-on activities to present at the three junior high schools. Various organizations from the high school go to inform incoming sophomores about the future opportunities. This is a great



opportunity for our officer team to interact with future members and spread information about our organization.



California State FFA Convention

The California State FFA Convention is where members from chapters all over the state meet to conduct business, compete, and win awards. Delegates from each chapter attend committees and elect officers to represent the state during the coming year. A major part of the state conference is the presentation and recognition of individuals and chapters in FFA career development events and other awards. Attending state conference is an honor. Chapter members should earn the

privilege of attending the convention through active participation in chapter activities. Students will demonstrate this participation through an application they submit to our chapter. Those that qualify will have the opportunity to attend this fun and exciting conference.

Banquet

The End of the Year Banquet is a way for us to celebrate a year full of amazing FFA memories. This event occurs in mid-May and is free for Davis Senior High students or ten dollars to anyone else wishing to attend. There is a reception that includes dinner, dessert, and a silent auction. The silent auction has items donated from FFA members such as plants from the greenhouse or Ag Mechanics projects. People can bid on these items to support the Davis FFA. Afterwards the ceremony begins where we formally install the officers for the coming year and the now past officers give their retiring address. There



are also awards honoring chapter members such as Star Greenhand, judging team recognition, and star members of each grade level. Members may also look forward to the end of the year slideshow and skits or acts done by classmates.



Yolo County Fair

The Yolo County Fair takes place mid-August every year in Woodland. Students can show livestock and ag. Mechanics projects. After the show, there is an auction where buyers will bid on and purchase the animals and mechanics projects. Historically, Davis students have raised pigs, goats, sheep, cattle, chickens, turkeys, and more! Fair animals are a student's responsibility to care for and pay for any expenses. However, any money from the sale of the animal goes to the student. This gives students a great opportunity to make

Service Days

Made for Excellence (MFE)

Experience Agriculture through SAE Projects

The supervised agricultural experience (SAE) program involves real-world agricultural activities done by students outside of planned classroom and laboratory time. SAE's provide a method for students to receive practical career skills in a part of agriculture that interests them. The SAE is formulated by the student with the support of parents, employers, and the agricultural instructor. The student will keep track of their hours worked and amount of money they earned within their AET record book.

SAE Categories

Entrepreneurship – Be your own boss! Develop your own mini business.

So, you want to be the boss? Now's your chance. Own and operate an agriculture-related business or enterprise—start small and watch what happens with hard work and perseverance. The basic requirement is that you own the enterprise, equipment and supplies, making the management decisions and taking financial risk, with the ultimate goal of earning a profit. As part of an ownership/entrepreneurship SAE, you might own and operate a lawn care service; produce bedding plants, flowers or crops; or raise animals or livestock.

Placement – Work for others in a real world setting!

If you like working for someone else, this is the SAE for you. You'll gain experience and knowledge, and you may be paid, too! Your job or internship could be on a farm or ranch or in an agricultural business, school laboratory or community facility. Track your progress by keeping records of the number of hours you work, your responsibilities and any earnings. Your placement SAE might involve working after school at a farm supply store, on Saturdays at a riding stable or even in a florist shop. Placement programs also include activities where you volunteer your time, learning valuable skills, but are not paid for your time. These unpaid hours can be done as directed school laboratory, community service or service-learning hours.

Research and Experimentation – Go beyond class research projects!

If you like to research or analyze, this is the SAE for you. You will plan and conduct a major agricultural experiment using the scientific process and discover new knowledge. As a part of your research SAE, you verify and demonstrate or learn about scientific principles in agriculture. Some types of research opportunities include determining if phases of the moon have an effect on plant growth or determining the strength of welds using different welding methods.

Exploratory – Get involved in 7th & 8th Grade Discovery!

In an exploratory SAE, you get to explore agriculture in one of a variety of ways. As a part of your exploratory SAE program, you might attend an agricultural career day or prepare a scrapbook on the work of a veterinarian.

Proficiency Awards

The Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through their SAEs, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. Students can compete for awards in 53 areas covering everything from Agricultural Communications to Wildlife Management. Each award area also has two categories, placement and entrepreneurship.

Apply for Proficiencies

The Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through their SAEs, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. Students can compete for awards in 53 areas covering everything from Agricultural Communications to Wildlife Management. Each award area has two categories, placement and entrepreneurship.

Placement proficiency awards are given to those whose SAEs are related to employment, apprenticeships, or internships at an agribusiness or agriculture-related organization.

Entrepreneurship proficiency awards are given to those whose SAEs are related to ownership of an agribusiness or agriculture-related organization.

Proficiency awards are given out at the local, sectional, regional, state and national levels.

Constitution

THE OFFICIAL CONSTITUTION OF THE DAVIS FFA CHAPTER

Article I. Name and Purposes

A. The **name** of this organization shall be the Davis FFA Chapter.

1. The letters "FFA" will be used to designate the chapter, its activities, and members.

- **B.** The **purposes** for which this chapter is formed by are as follows:
- 1. To develop agricultural leadership skills among all members.
- 2. To develop a global awareness of agriculture.
- 3. To bestow confidence among agricultural students and their work.
- 4. To promote agriculture career opportunities through hands-on training.
- 5. To develop competencies in communication, human relations, and social abilities.
- 6. To build cooperative attitudes among agricultural students.
- 7. To encourage improvement in scholastics.
- 8. To provide organized recreational activities for agriculture students.

Article II. Organization

A. The Davis Chapter of FFA is a chartered local entity of the Yolo Section of the California Association, made up of local members.

B. This chapter accepts in full the provision in the constitution and bylaws of the California Association of the FFA as well as those of the National FFA Organization.

Article III. Membership

A. Membership is limited to students enrolled in CTE Agriculture at Davis High School and officially recognized and articulated agriculture programs of DJUSD Junior High Programs.

B. Membership of graduates is limited to students that were active members in high school.

C. The Davis FFA is a 100% affiliated chapter with every student becoming a member of the FFA when they enroll in an agricultural class.

D. No students may participate in any FFA activities unless they are members in good standing.

E. The head FFA advisor at Davis Senior High, at their own discretion, has the right to dismiss any member from the FFA organization at any time with approval of DSH site

administration.

F. Membership in this chapter shall be of three kinds: Active, Alumni, Honorary. As defined by the National FFA Constitution:

1. The regular work of this chapter shall be carried on by the active membership.

2. Honorary membership in the chapter shall be limited to the Honorary FFA Degree.

3. There shall be five levels of active membership in this chapter. These levels are:

The Discovery Degree for 7th and 8th grade members in articulated agriculture programs of DJUSD Junior High Schools.

The Greenhand FFA Degree

All "Greenhand's" are entitled to wear the regulation bronze emblem charm

The Chapter FFA Degree

All members holding the Chapter FFA Degree are entitled to wear the silver emblem charm.

The State FFA Degree

All members holding the degree of State FFA are entitled to wear the regulation gold emblem charm

The American FFA Degree

All members holding the degree of American FFA are entitled to wear the regulation gold emblem key.

G. Discovery FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election are outlined in the most current FFA Manual.

1. Be enrolled in agricultural education and have satisfactory plans for an exploratory SAE.

2. Describe and explain the meaning of the FFA emblem and colors.

3. Have access to the Official FFA Manual and FFA Student Handbook.

4. Submit written application for the Discovery FFA Degree

H. Greenhand FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

1. Be enrolled in agricultural education and have satisfactory plans for a supervised agricultural experience program.

2. Learn and explain the FFA Creed, Motto, and Salute.

3. Describe and explain the meaning of the FFA emblem and colors.

4. Demonstrate a knowledge of the FFA Code of Ethics and the proper use of the FFA jacket.

5. Demonstrate a knowledge of the history of the organization, the chapter constitution and bylaws and the chapter Program of Activities.

6. Have access to the Official FFA Manual and FFA Student Handbook.

7. Submit a written application for the Greenhand FFA Degree.

I. Chapter FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

1. Must have received the Greenhand FFA Degree.

2. Must be enrolled in their second year of agricultural education and have an approved Supervised Agricultural Experience Program.

3. Participate in planning and conducting of at least three official chapter functions.

4. Have earned at least \$150.00 or worked at least 45 hours and have developed plans for the growth of the SAEP.

5. Have effectively led a group discussion for 15 minutes.

6. Have demonstrated five procedures of procedure law.

7. Shows progress towards individual achievement in the FFA awards programs.

8. Have a satisfactory scholastic record.

9. Submit a written application for the Chapter FFA Degree.

J. State FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election: Qualifications for the State FFA Degree are those set forth in the Constitution of the National FFA Organization.

K. American FFA Degree. Minimum qualifications for election: Qualifications for the American FFA are those set forth in the Constitution of the National FFA Organization.

L. Special committees shall review the qualifications of members and make recommendations to the chapter concerning degree advancement.

Article IV. Officers

A. The officers of the chapter shall be as follows: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter, Sentinel, Advisor.

1. The local advisors shall be the teachers of agricultural education in the school where the program is located. The head advisor of the chapter is the lead advisor for the chapter at Davis Senior High.

2. The officers shall perform the usual duties of the respective officers as outlined in the Official FFA Manual.

B. President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter, Sentinel, and, if elected, Historian shall be elected or confirmed by a majority vote of the active members with the exception of the

advisors who shall be the agriculture education instructors.

C. The nominating committee shall be composed of the 12th grade chapter officers, and advisors. After reviewing officer applications for chapter office they will slate candidates on the ballot.

D. All officer vacancies, during the term of office, shall be filled by a majority vote of the chapter officers with the exception of the president whose vacancy shall be filled by the Vice President. The president shall nominate candidates for the committee's consideration.

E. Officer Eligibility. Minimum qualifications to run for chapter office:

1. Must have and maintain a 2.5 Grade Point Average.

2. For offices of President and Vice President, the applicant must have already completed at least 2 years of Ag classes and/or hold the Chapter FFA Degree.

3. Other offices require that they have completed a year of an Ag class and hold the Greenhand Degree.

Article V. Impeachment of Officers

A. Immediate Impeachment

The FFA advisors may at any time and at their own discretion remove an officer who has repeatedly disregarded their duties by not fulfilling them to their best ability.

B. Steps of Impeachment

Any FFA Chapter Officer not fulfilling the duties of the office as described by this constitution. A written plan for improvement will be drawn up by the advisor based on the conversation of the meeting in Step 1, and will be confirmed and signed by the FFA President, Vice President, and the officer in question. If the officer in question still does not fulfill their duties, then a 2/3 vote of the executive committee will remove that officer from office.

Article VI. Executive Committee

A. Meetings shall be held once a month or as needed. The exact date will be set by the Executive Committee.

B. Standard meeting paraphernalia shall be used at each meeting. All special meetings shall open and close with the official ceremony. Paraphernalia shall be used at each meeting. All special meetings shall open and close with the official ceremony. Parliamentary Procedure shall be used in transacting all business at each meeting.

C. Poor conduct will result in that member being dismissed from the meeting room.

D. Non-officer Delegates go through an application process headed by the Ag staff to be able to represent the chapter at the State Convention.

Article VII. Dues

A. As long as departmental funds are available, dues for all members shall be paid through school and not Chapter funds (Ed.Code)..

Article VIII. Eligibility

A. Eligibility of members exhibiting at fairs and shows will be based on the ADVISORS DISCRETION.

B. Members must maintain a 2.0 Grade Point Average overall to be eligible to participate above the chapter level.

Article IX. Amendments

A. To amend the constitution, a 2/3 vote of the active members is required.

B. To become effective, an amendment must be posted for two weeks previous to the vote of the active members.

Article X. Ratification of the Constitution

A. This constitution shall become effective when passed by a majority vote of the members voting.

Article XI. Meetings

A. Time: No less than nine meetings per school year, holding one per month.

Article XII. Officers

A. Qualifications for officers:

1. No student shall be eligible to hold an office if they have less than a 2.5 GPA for the preceding grading period.

2. The president shall have completed two years of Ag courses with at least a 2.5 overall GPA and other officers must have completed one year of Ag courses

3. The candidate for any office should show interest in the chapter through participation on judging teams, project work, or any public relations connected with the chapter.

4. The following officers shall be elected at the April chapter meeting: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter and Sentinel. The office of Historian and Student Body Representative will be appointed by the executive committee.

5. If an officer has less than a 2.5 on a progress report (or an F) then they are on probation until quarter.

6. If an officer still has less than a 2.5 or an F, then they will be removed from the officer team.

B. Officer Responsibilities:

1. President:

It shall be the duty of the president to preside over all meetings of the Davis Chapter of Future Farmers of America and over the meetings of the officers.

The president shall call the meeting once a month.

The president shall call the meetings of the chapter or of the executive committee when requested to do so by a majority vote of the executive committee or request of the advisor. The president shall serve as the officer liaison on the banquet committee and act as the chapter voting delegate

2. Vice President:

The vice president shall assume all duties of the president in the event that the office becomes vacant by the resignation. They shall preside over all meeting in the absence of the president and shall assume such other duties of the president as signed by the executive committee and act as a chapter voting delegate

3. Secretary:

The Secretary shall perform the duties common to such an office. They shall maintain member attendance and activity records

4. Treasurer:

The Treasurer shall be the ex-officio chairman of the Finances-Audit Committee and shall represent the chapter in all matters pertaining to the financial budget and policy. They shall present to the chapter an audit of the account of the chapter, which is prepared under the direction of the advisors.

The Treasurer shall serve as the officer liaison to the Savings and Earnings Committee. 5. Reporter:

It shall be the duty of the Reporter to report activities to the local newspaper and to keep the chapter informed through the Chapter website and social media outlets.

The reporter shall serve as the officer liaison for the Scholarship Committee and assist the Historian in maintaining a scrapbook.

6. Sentinel:

It shall be the duty of the Sentinel to assist in the conduct of the meetings by greeting guests, arranging the paraphernalia, displays and decorations, and carrying out other duties assigned by the President.

The Sentinel shall serve as the liaison for the recreation committee and coordinate the Active Membership socials. The Sentinel Is also in charge of all Point Awards Systems.

7. Historian:

It shall be the duty of the Historian to assist the Reporter in keeping the chapter and the public informed about the FFA as well as maintaining a scrapbook for the chapter records. The historian shall serve as the liaison for the scrapbook committee.

8. Advisor:

The Advisor shall be a member of the Executive Committee and an ex-officio member of all committees. It is their duty to advise the Executive Committee and other committees on all matters of policy and to assist the officers in conducting the meetings and programs.

The Advisor shall review all officer reports and other business of the chapter. Their word shall be final in the case of interpretation of the Constitution and Bylaws. They may establish regular meetings of the Executive Committee.

The Advisor shall handle all funds of the organization and shall prepare a statement for the Finances and Audit Committee at the close of the years' activities. They shall sign purchase orders for the Davis FFA as necessary to transact the business of the chapter.
